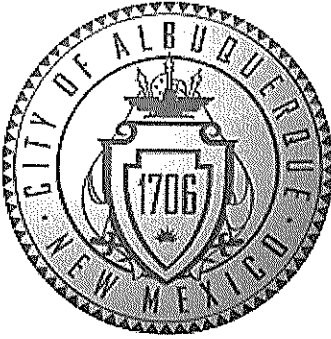

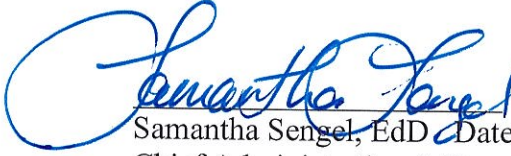
SUBJECT: 2027 Administration Priority Capital and Policy Requests

OPERATIONAL AND HOUSING REQUESTS

HOUSING, RECOVERY, AND STABILITY FUND.....\$150,000,000/ 3 YEARS

The City of Albuquerque proposes a \$150 million state investment to create immediate operating stability, dedicated behavioral health and opioid-response capacity, new transitional housing, direct rental assistance in the form of housing vouchers, and longer-term system improvements.

These investments would result in 2,000 people being **permanently** housed.

The Gateway System served more than 7,000 people in FY26, helping people move off the street and toward lasting stability. Over 1,000 people are engaged in services nightly through the Gateway System.

The proposed partnership gives the State a measurable return with transparent quarterly reporting and safeguards against double counting.

HOUSING STABILITY FUND..... \$50,000,000/ 3 YEARS

\$50 Million to be spent over 3 years for filling the gap in housing needs in Albuquerque including affordable housing, workforce housing and project-based vouchers.

The State previously appropriated over \$20 million in housing resources which have resulted in 294 affordable units with 444 more on the way.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT STABILIZATION FUND.....\$50,000,000

As the State of New Mexico sits on billions of dollars across various funds and reserves, municipal governments face uncertainty regarding federal funding and policies, having incorporated anticipated federal awards into budget planning for current and future fiscal years, many of which are now being interrupted. This proposed fund would ensure that major projects remain on schedule and that essential services are maintained.

CRIME LAB OPERATIONAL FUNDING.....\$3,000,000/ 3 YEARS

In addition to requests to meet technology and equipment capital needs, the City of Albuquerque requests operational funding for the crime lab, which processes evidence collected by Albuquerque Police Department including, but not limited to: DNA, fingerprinting, substances, and firearms.

Administration Policy Priorities

Metro Crime Initiative



For seven years, MCI has taken a comprehensive approach to making Albuquerque safer. By aligning the efforts of law enforcement and service providers, Albuquerque is using targeted strategies to prevent crime, intervene early, divert when possible, and enforce when necessary.



FIGHT CRIME

- Common sense regulations on large capacity magazines and bump stocks.
- Prioritize enforcement efforts against drug trafficking and distribution networks.
- Create recurring funding for crime lab.
- Prioritize and address backlog of missing persons cases.
- Deter copper theft by increasing regulations for who sells copper.

REDUCE GUN VIOLENCE

- Stronger Penalties for possessing firearms in drug distribution crimes.
- New charges in firing off a gun in public.
- New charges for carrying a firearm while intoxicated.
- Fund the New Mexico office of Gun Violence Prevention.
- Increase state penalties for felon convicted of a "serious violent offense" in possession of a firearm to reduce gun violence and enhance public safety.
- Establish partnerships to identify sources of firearm trafficking.



PRIORITIES COMPLETED

- ✓ Close loopholes in Red Flag Law.
- ✓ Longer sentences for second-degree murder.
- ✓ Designate 2nd degree homicide by vehicle to a serious violent offense.
- ✓ Introduce temporary "return to work" legislation to allow qualified/certified officers to return to duty.
- ✓ \$6.5 million helicopter & help from NMSP to patrol when APD's helicopter is unavailable.
- ✓ Increase speed detection devices to monitor and enforce speed limits throughout all roads within the city.

PRIORITIES PARTIALLY ADDRESSED

(In past sessions)

- ✓ State funding and direct participation in warrant backlog initiative.
- ✓ Fix "asset forfeiture" law to increase funding for public education & support drug trafficking investigations.
- ✓ \$10 million to expand gun shot detection technology.
- ✓ \$10 million for two additional police substations in high crime areas.
- ✓ \$20 million expansion of the Real Time Crime Center, and \$10 million in new cameras to help with investigations.
- ✓ Increase funding for violent crime investigative units to expand crime investigation resources.
- ✓ Expand ACS's School-Based Violence Intervention Program (SBVIP) to all middle and high schools.
- ✓ Increase penalties for reckless driving crashes involving speeding that cause death or great bodily harm.
- ✓ Enact stricter street racing penalties.

BOLSTER COURTS TO CLOSE THE REVOLVING DOOR

- Establish a dedicated 'fentanyl court'.
- Enhance domestic violence penalties and breadth of laws.
- Fund peer support programs for crime victims.
- Career training in behavioral health for underserved youth.
- Establish and fund a community victim's ombudsman.

STRENGTHEN COLLABORATIONS AND PROCEDURES

- Establish medical check protocols between UNM Hospital and Metropolitan Detention Center (MDC).
- Work with Bernalillo County to identify and resolve bottlenecks when individuals are taken to jail.

- Mandate that prosecutors utilize habitual offender enhancements.
- Increase Retention of law enforcement by expanding tax credit opportunities.
- Seeking mandatory mental health checks for individuals purchasing assault rifles.

ADDRESSING AND PREVENTING JUVENILE VIOLENCE

- Addressing the influence of social media on youth to commit acts of violence.
- Extend the referendum on violent juvenile diversion programs.
- Invest in youth programming in community centers for early intervention.
- Increase access to diversionary programs and establish triage system to direct youth to intervention services.
- Increase number of beds in Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) to ensure violent serious youth offenders can be accommodated.
- Establish a task force of experts on youth and human

development to study challenges and give recommendations on possible solutions to support youth.

- Study the impact of COVID-19 isolation and school closures in youth

SUPPORT EXPANSION OF ACS FOOTPRINT

- Establish a fentanyl specific response team.
- Incentivize new provider services.
- Develop behavioral health training/career path programs.
- Expand treatment programs for mental/behavioral health problems.

INCREASE ROADWAY SAFETY

- Create technology safety net for forensic evidentiary purposes and future crime solving.
- Create task force to address road rage incidents and collaborate with other law enforcement agencies.
